### “Beggars All”

A while back three men and I went down to Greensburg, Kansas. We went there to deliver and dedicate a portable church that was built by Orphan Grain Train and LCMS World Relief, and had been given over to the use of Peace Lutheran Church in Greensburg. Greensburg was a town of 1,400 people on the Kansas prairie, about 40 miles from Dodge City, the famous cow town of romantic western cattle drives. I have never seen devastation and ruin that was so complete. Nine people died as the tornado doubled back for a second lick. The only structure left standing with any kind of recognizable form was the courthouse. The town was 12 blocks long and 12 blocks wide and the only things remaining were the paved streets and the largest hand-dug well in the world. Thirty feet wide and 100 feet deep and covered with a concrete slab; it remained. But the well house above it was destroyed. Reconstruction in the town had just begun, even though the mile wide tornado happened 5 months before. I asked one of the survivors how come the town took so long to accept help in rebuilding. He said, because we Kansans are fiercely independent! It

took them 5 months to begin accepting help from Christian helping agencies like World Relief and Orphan Grain Train.

When I compare that to Hurricane Katrina victims in 2005, I see a great difference in willingness to accept help. When Hurricane Katrina happened, OGT began delivering, and victims began accepting, semi loads of groceries within 24 hours of the storm. The difference of 5 months and 24 hours to accept help begs the question: When is it appropriate to seek help? When is it appropriate to become a beggar, and when isn't it? Was Jesus a beggar when he accepted a dinner invitation to eat at the house of the Pharisee in the story? Was Jesus a beggar when he accepted provision from the women who followed Him and his disciples out of Galilee, women like Mary from Magdalla, out of whom he cast 7 demons. Was Jesus a beggar when he so often came to the house of Lazareth and Mary and Martha in Bethany? Or was he simply accepting hospitality and showing how to both receive and give hospitality. Hospitality is a word that comes from two Greek words: Philo and Kenios. Philo means fondness or favoring toward and Kenios means the health and comfort of new

arrivals.

We know that Jesus taught like Aristotle taught; he moved around from place to place as he taught his disciples. The whole landscape and all its people became the laboratory. Everything was visual, auditory, and life related. His teaching soaked into their hides and into their life-related consciousness. Not only was Jesus moving about constantly, but also He knew that his followers would soon be running for their lives. They would be sojourners, just like Israel coming out of Egypt were sojourners. In this lesson in the house of the Pharisee, Jesus is teaching us how to be humble sojourners, capable of both giving and receiving help with a glad and open heart. The Pharisees in Jesus' story were not able to either give or to receive help, because they had made rules, beyond Moses rules, about helping on the Sabbath. Moses had said that you could pull your donkey or your son out of a well on the Sabbath. The Pharisees had ruled that you can water your donkey on the Sabbath, but if you pull him out of a well you have done work on the Sabbath. Jesus immediately heals the man with "hydropikos, water edema," called dropsy, on the Sabbath to show how God exercises hospitality to strangers, even on the Sabbath. It took the people in Kansas a little longer to accept hospitality than it did for the people in Louisiana. But I doubt if they

would abuse the hospitality like some did in Katrina-land, insisting upon their rights instead of beginning to help themselves. Proper hospitality always avoids the abuse of co-dependency. Proper hospitality always helps when help is needed—but proper hospitality allows for personal growth and self-sufficiency. Being a sojourner in a strange land offers plenty of opportunity for hospitality to be exercised. Sometimes to even be insisted upon.

In 1975, my son and I and two other missionaries were working on a water project for the Lutheran Hospital in the mountain region of Luzon at Abatan. We built a system that carried water from a spring six miles high in the mountains of Luzon. We hauled six miles of 2 ½ inch plastic and galvanized pipe from Manila, three days drive to Abatan in six-by-trucks that we had gotten from USAID, that came out of Vietnam. One night after the project was completed and the whole hospital was celebrating, we loaded the excess galvanized pipe onto an improvised wooden rack built above the canvas cab of the truck and headed the 90 miles down mountain trail for Baguio. As we bounced along down mountain trail we noticed that the wooden scaffolding holding those two tons of pipes was beginning to come apart, and the pipes were beginning to slide off the back of the truck. Besides that, the provincial

constabulary's midnight curfew was only an hour away and we were still 20 miles from Baguio. So I backed the truck into the mountain hoping to slide the pipes back on the truck and with that the front scaffold let go, dropping the pipe onto the windshield and onto our heads. After thinking for a time what to do, because it was now beginning to get cold, I got out of the truck and walked about a half mile down the road hoping to catch another truck coming up the mountain. After 30 minutes, one lonely truck came rumbling up the mountain and he was empty. I asked him if he would be so kind as to let us off-load our truck onto his. "I will give you 350 pesos if you will help us." He flatly refused. So I said, "Let me put this another way, our truck is parked crossways on the mountain trail, with the pipe fallen down around our ears. We can go neither forward or back. Perhaps we can survive curfew together. Perhaps the constabulary won't shoot at us for being out after curfew?" He helped us transfer the load to his truck and together we slipped past the sleeping constabulary outpost at one o'clock in the morning and crawled safely into our beds in Baguio.

Hospitality can be exercised in a variety of ways. Jesus got into the face of his host because the host was exercising the wrong kind of hospitality, showing favoritism to the wealthy and

influential. He demonstrated his willingness to let love rule over custom in healing the man with dropsy on the Sabbath. Hebrews 13:2 says: "Let brotherly love continue. Do not neglect to show hospitality to strangers, for thereby some have entertained angels without knowing it." Pastor Wilke

## Store Up Treasures in Heaven

Jesus tells us that temporal and worldly things have no lasting value. Because we are to be in the world but not of the world, we are warned not to store up treasures on earth. The world tells us is that we need to invest our time, energy, and savings in order to obtain the treasures of the world. The message from the world is that we find happiness and life in the accumulation of things. Contrary to that message, Jesus says, “Do not lay up for yourselves treasures on earth, where moth and rust destroy and where thieves break in and steal, but lay up for yourselves treasures in heaven, where neither moth nor rust destroys and where thieves do not break in and steal” (Matthew 6:19-20). No earthly treasures will give us long-term happiness. When we accumulate more things on earth, we become more burdened with their upkeep and maintenance. Material things become a distraction, even a weight. The things we own will either become worthless due to inflation, become obsolete, wear out, or be stolen. Earthly treasures have limited

value and purpose.

In contrast, Jesus directs us to store up treasures in heaven that will last. We store up treasures in heaven by helping and serving others, extending God’s kingdom, and giving generously. God wants us not to spend all our time, talents, and money on ourselves. Our best treasure comes from living as God directs. His ways involve generously helping others. When God opens our hearts and minds, He changes our desires and enables us to store up treasures in heaven. We store up treasures in heaven because we know, by God’s grace, that our real home is with Him.

May God help us all fix our eyes on Jesus and not on the things of this world, and may He help us keep material things from becoming overly important to us. Remember that, when we store up treasures in heaven, those treasures will be with us for eternity.

## Grace Lutheran Church Voters’ Minutes October 18, 2022

After a quorum had been established, President Maynard Thompson called the mtg to order at 7:02 p.m. Pastor Asbury had an opening devotion, which include Hymn #648.

New members: A motion was made & seconded to welcome Adrian & Sarah Boelter as new voters. **Approved.**

Minutes: A motion was made & seconded to approve minutes of the Voters Mtg, dated 7/19/22. **Approved.**

Treasurer's Report: Kristen Rosner highlighted her report, dated 10/18/22. BALANCE SHEET, ASSETS: #1000 Unrestricted Funds, \$437.11. Although this number is low, it's been lower in recent months. LIABILITIES & EQUITY: #2408 Maintenance & Repair Loan, \$47,186.92. This is \$1,600 less than reported at the last Voters Mtg. #2406 Operating Note, \$46,300.00. This is \$15,000 more than reported at the last Voters Mtg. It was noted that our line-of-credit is \$50,000. PROFIT & LOSS BUDGET VS ACTUAL, ORDINARY INCOME/EXPENSE: #4100, \$400,813.83. #4101 Synod Mission Income, \$8913.64. This amount is 2% of our giving thru 9/30/22. CHURCH MINISTRY EXPENSES: #6200.07 Christ Lutheran School, 87.2%. Since we have more students at CLS than anticipated, we will probably go over budget. #6200.08 Lutheran High Northeast, 109.2%. We are over budget, due to more students at LHNE than we anticipated. Net ordinary income is - \$56,770.05. Kristen further noted the following. (1) Most everything else is within budget or below. (2) Over the last few months, we have really worked to cut back on expenses. (3) Income has not kept up with expenses. A motion was made & seconded to approve the

Treasurer's Report. **Approved.**

Rev. Asbury's Report: Pastor Asbury shared these highlights. (1) An indicator of a healthy congregation in the District is the percentage of the congregation that is in Bible study. This is how our faith grows. (2) RightNow Media, a new Bible resource, has been made available for all members at no cost. (3) We baptize & teach, which is why we have a big investment in ministry, including support for CLS & LHNE. (4) Ten youth attended the National Youth Gathering in Houston last summer. (5) Thirteen middle school & junior high students will attend the District Youth Gathering next month.

Rev. Wilke: Pastor Wilke provided an update re: his health.

Elder's Report: Glenn Spreeman shared these highlights. (1) Elders have been working on budget items for the past few months. (2) The proposed budget for 2023 is frugal without cutting essentials. (3) Elders are very pleased with the willingness of those who have agreed to stand for election. (4) They are especially pleased that the number of Elders is expanding.

Membership Changes: Glenn Spreeman also reported the following membership changes, which the Elders have approved. Justin & Kayla Shaver & their children have transferred to another LCMS church. Brian & Jennifer Lampert & their children have

transferred to another LCMS church. Bob Hering has been transferred to another LCMS church.

Trustees Report: Rob Jenkins shared these highlights. (1) Roof repairs on the south side of the new addition have been completed. Funding was provided by the Endowment Committee. (2) Yellow lines will be painted on the alley & parking lot to aid traffic flow after school, since CLS students are being picked up at Grace. (3) Trustees have spent most of their time over the past few months concentrating on the budget. (4) Only essential expenses have been paid.

Board of Education: No report.

Family Life Committee: Pastor Asbury shared these highlights. (1) Plans continue to add Stephen Ministries. (2) Next training is in March, & we are looking for people to train. (3) Seven of our college students are receiving gift cards. (5) Moms & Tots is back in full swing.

Memorials Committee: Kristen Rosner reported that the committee has not met, due to no requests.

Endowment Committee: No report.

Christ Lutheran School: Principal Drew Urban highlighted his written report, which included information re: enrollment, spiritual life, marketing, academics, staff, building project & other miscellaneous items. Noteworthy items: (1) Enrollment has increased

from 224 students in 2019-2020 to 272 students this year. (2) The building project, which may be completed sooner than anticipated, will still require additional gifts & pledges. (3) He expressed his appreciation for Grace allowing students to dismiss to Grace after school. (4) He also expressed appreciation for Grace's support & commitment to Christian education.

Lutheran High Northeast: Principal Dan Sievert highlighted his written report, which included news & notes, enrollment, dates to know, & the construction project. Noteworthy items: (1) Enrollment increased from 124 students in 2021-2022 to 137 students this year. (2) Gifts have made it possible to pay all construction costs up till now. Pledges will fund remaining costs, but a bridge loan will be necessary in the near future. (3) The new additions should be ready by January, 2023. (4) He expressed his appreciation for Grace's support & commitment to Christian education.

Action items – Proposed Budget for 2023: Maynard Thompson highlighted the work done by the Budget Committee, Church Council, Elders, & Trustees, & expressed his appreciation for their work. Kristen Rosner highlighted these items. **DONATIONS & DUES:** There is no longer a payment due for the District Campaign, since the 3-year pledge is paid off in 2022.

**CHURCH OPERATION EXPENSES:**

These expenses make up 18% of the proposed budget. Insurance expense has been increased. Repairs & Maintenance & Office Supplies have been decreased.

**CHURCH MINISTRY EXPENSES:**

These expenses make up 35% of our budget. CLS expenses have been increased by \$48,800, due to more students anticipated. LHNE expenses have been increased by \$6,100, although the same number of students is anticipated. A 5% tuition increase has been projected.

**PERSONNEL EXPENSES:** A 3.5% increase in salaries is proposed. A \$4,000 stipend for Youth Coordinator is proposed. John & April Laskowski have agreed to serve part-time in this position, while Pastor Asbury continues to provide help.

**PROPOSED 2023 BUDGET:** \$697,619, which is a \$47,712 increase from 2022.

Concerns were expressed, since income is not keeping pace with expenses. Kristen noted that a relatively modest increase in giving by families & members would meet our expenses. There was discussion re: how to make our members aware of this need. Suggestions were made. A motion was made & seconded to pray for our financial needs & approve the 2023 proposed budget, as presented. **Approved.**

Action Items – Elections for 2023:

The Nominating Committee’s report for 2023 officers was presented. Pastor Asbury highlighted the process used to “recruit” nominees. Appreciation was expressed for outgoing officers & for those willing to serve. A motion was made & seconded to cast a unanimous ballot. **Approved.** The following officers were elected: President, Brad Dinkel; Vice-President, Kent Warneke; Secretary, Paul Leckband; Treasurer, Kristen Rosner; Finance Secretary, Marge Reikofski; Board of Education, Nick Griffith; Trustees, Rob Mercer; Elders, Adrian Boelter, Dan Green, Phil Carlson, Dustin Bauer; Counting assistants, Linda Baumann, Marjorie Jansen, Jennifer Racine, Dianne Reikofski, Connie Bichlmeier.

A motion was made & seconded to adjourn the mtg at 8:18 p.m. **Approved.** Mtg closed with the Lord’s Prayer. Respectfully submitted,
